

Jubilee Fest 1-5 June 2022

This festival was organised by the Community Engagement team, as approved by the Key Area Group in October 2021. The team wanted to commemorate this event whilst working within a framework of a request for more events to be spread throughout the year. The transition from a 9-day summer festival to a 5-day Jubilee Fest provided the step-down opportunity to do this.

The events were held during the school holiday half term, commencing Wednesday 1 June through to Sunday 5 June. Thursday 2 June and Friday 3 June were national holidays to commemorate the Platinum Jubilee. Guidance was provided by Pageant Master Bruno Peek on activities that would be welcomed (beacon lighting and piper performance) during this time with example press release format. We delivered the Beacon Lighting event as part of Concert in the Park and this was promoted via the national Platinum Jubilee website.

Event summary

The Town Council worked in partnership with groups to deliver events and we promoted the below.

In addition to the 12 events listed above, there were additional events held to include a tea party for Horticultural Club members at Cyprus Hall on Wednesday 1 June; The Kiln Open Day on Thursday 2 June held in the Kiln open to all; Cricket Tea Party held at the pavilion on Friday 3 June open to all; Burgess Hill Constitutional Club event held on Friday 3 June open to all.

Finally, the Town Council promoted street parties with downloadable invites on our website and requested that the community send pictures in for us to share.

Burgess Hill Town Council installed the red/white/blue bunting on the preceding week in Church Walk and Church Road (first time installed in Church Road since 2015) and a local floristry business installed red/white/blue ribbons on lampposts throughout the town.

In summary, there were plenty of events in the town for the local community to enjoy in a vibrant, sunny town!

Publicity

The 12 events were promoted via the following methods

- March issue of About Town delivered to 14,000 households
- Two large banners installed at Triangle Roundabout and McDonalds roundabout promoting the 5-day festival
- Press releases sent to local newspapers
- 18 noticeboards across the town
- Residents' letters delivered by hand to approximately 300 residents surrounding St John's Park and 500 residents surrounding Fairfield Recreation Ground
- Help Point front window and electronic display inside
- Event notifications to those that have signed up to the mailing list listing (233)
- Social media publicity – clearly defined programme setting up event invites to public to confirm attendance therefore giving reminders; trickle approach to promote who will be there – for example Concert in the Park biographies of performing acts were given to build up the event.

Costs

The Jubilee Festival had £10,500 allocated to this funding pot as agreed at the Community Engagement Key Area Group held in October 2021, and subsequently approved by the Finance Key Area Group in November 2021. The full budget and spend can be reviewed at Appendix 1. The festival did come within the agreed budget parameters. There were also staffing costs which amounted to approximately of 100 hours overtime for the community team to be considered.

Feedback on the events – we requested feedback from our partners we worked with and these are included in the event details below. We also created a special QR code that was displayed at the events – this took the public that scanned to the code to a created google form asking them questions on the events to include what they liked and what could have been better. The results received are at Appendix 2.

Events in detail – the following section provides more information on each event that the Town Council publicised.

1. **Wowzer Wednesday** - this was for the young people in the community with free inflatable activities. The Town Council engaged Altitude Events and Brighton Bouncy Castles to provide a laser tag; bungee run; slide and bouncy castle. The Triangle Leisure Centre attended with their bounce and roll equipment targeted at 2-5 years whilst promoting their centre. Mid Downs Radio attended the event ensuring £100 (fee charged) went back into their funds as a local community group. The event was very successful with no first aid incidents; one lost child (lost in an area in the park separate from the event and found within 1 minute of advising the team within the area they were lost in); and great weather.... for the first three hours! There was then a significant downpour which led to the event ending early to ensure safety was not compromised. We had asked the local ice cream provider situated on the park to bring a trike to the immediate vicinity therefore ensuring support for a local trader.

Feedback on the event – Brighton Bouncy Castles suggested larger equipment for the number of people the event attracted. The Triangle Leisure Centre found it worthwhile to attend to promote their activities.

2. **Burnside Jubilee Community Celebration** – the first hour in the gardens was lovely with the event starting with a Makaton performance of ‘God Save the Queen’ and then a performance by Mid Sussex Brass Band of uplifting music. The Burnside community had created lovely displays of events that had happened during the Queen’s reign and did a beautiful performance of ‘This Is Me’. The funds from the raffle exceeded £345 and the Burnside community requested this go to The Prince’s Trust. This was the first time the Town Council worked with Burnside and a good working relationship was established. Andy and the team were very receptive to working together and this was instigated all down to an increased social media presence by Burnside sharing their activities.

Feedback on the event – Burnside were very happy to launch the Jubilee Festival celebrations and very proud of their performance. They raised £345 from raffle ticket sales which were donated to The Prince’s Trust.

“The feedback we’ve received from our managers and directors regarding the Jubilee event has been overwhelmingly positive, as well as from the local community (as I’m sure you’ve seen on our Facebook page). Most importantly – the people who use the service appeared to enjoy themselves immensely being hosts to the people of Burgess Hill. Thank you again for the opportunity.”

3. **Skatefest** – held in St John’s Park organised by Sally Blackmore at Mid Sussex District Council with a target age range of 10 -16 years. A successful event in which the Town Council role was simply to assist with publicity. We worked to ensure the DJ set was located in an acceptable area for a concerned surrounding business, organising a site visit in advance. We

ensured the music of this event and the Wowzer Wednesday did not compete ensuring the DJ sets at Skate Fest took priority.

Feedback on the event – successful event despite the downpour at the start of the event. Sussex Clubs for Young People did very well with crafts and the DJ set was enjoyed by many.

4. **Jubilee Arts Day** at Cherry Tree Centre was an event organised in partnership with Mid Sussex Voluntary Action, based at the Cherry Tree Centre. MSVA were successful in securing a grant from Sussex Community Foundation/Arts Foundation. There were 6 pre-bookable sessions available - 2 focused on Crowns, Bunting and Tiaras with a target age range of 5-10 years (40 places available) and 4 sessions on a tile painting work shop (100 places available) targeted at all ages. The purpose of the tile painting workshop was to create a permanent installation at the Cherry Tree Centre to commemorate the Platinum Jubilee. Of the spaces available, 88 people attended. The venue was decorated in advance of the arriving public, there was a celebration cake to commemorate the Jubilee, and the community café at the centre was also open welcoming the community. It was lovely to see our newly arrived Ukrainian refugees welcomed to the celebration. Photos of the event were also submitted to BBC South East and featured on the evening news.

Feedback on the event – the following were provided from MSVA

“Thank you so much too. Yes, our overriding feeling was that it was a very successful event and it was great to work in partnership with you. All the feedback we received was very positive, and it was good to invite new people into the building to see what we can offer the local community here. The only couple of things from us would be – there were a number of people who didn’t come to the event that they had booked, which is some ways is inevitable with free events but I wonder if there is any way to mitigate this? Also, we were quite quiet in the afternoon so ideally, we could have run another activity in the afternoon in parallel. You all did an amazing job across all of your many events. Huge congratulations and thanks for us.”

“Just to back up Nicola’s thanks from us for the terrific effort from the Town Council crew, across all the events.”

Consideration does need to be given on future events on ticket allocation when it is free in view of the number of no shows on the day. The Town Council will consider this for future events.

5. **Concert in the Park** - this was the largest event of the festival, open to all ages as a free event in the park. The weather was perfect for the duration and the event saw the largest crowd for a public event held in that area of the park for some time. The evening was opened by the Town Mayor and hosted by local musical performer Tobias Alexander featuring live music from the Spinettes. The Bonfire Society provided a BBQ and also lit the beacon at the designated time of 9.45pm. Live musical performances were provided by Ariel Theatre Group; Tobias and Dan Russell. Mid Sussex Radio supported the event providing a stage and their outside broadcast unit. The cricket club opened their bar to the public and

also provided a green room area for the musical performers. We had asked the local ice cream provider situated on the park to bring a trike to the immediate vicinity therefore ensuring support for a local trader.

Feedback on the event:

“THE SPINETTES had such a wonderful time performing for you yesterday! They said what a lovely event it was and if you need them or any other entertainment for anything in the future, please just let us know.”

Cricket Club: “Re the concert in the Park – it was a roaring success. The bar took some £1,300 in takings on which the club would clear around £600 after all costs. A few of those each year and we are in a healthy state.”

Burgess Hill Bonfire Society: “£587.31 raised towards the society funds.” They also received funding towards lighting of the beacon and marshalling the event.

Mid Sussex Radio: “The Concert in the Park was a great idea and the performers were of a high standard. The piper was excellent and the pipes were loud enough on their own without needing our PA. The audience seemed happy and I think everyone enjoyed the event. The stage made the whole event look very professional. Estimated attendance 1500.”

As an Events Team at the Town Council, we considered the following points:

12 toilets to be booked for a future event this size as well as rubbish collection and consider booking security. We also discussed the event being held in an enclosed venue and potentially ticketed. The stage was good and would be investigated for the Christmas event in Church Walk. It all went according to the planned programme. There were minor technical issues with the Spinettes performance with microphone issues. We had asked the local ice cream provider situated on the park to bring a trike to the immediate vicinity therefore ensuring support for a local trader. The Kiosk in the Park also provided support with rubbish clearance at the end of the event as there was more than expected. The area was left completely clear.

6. **Jubilee Festival Quiz Night** – this was held at the Woolpack Inn and led by the Woolpack Inn. It was a successful event with 19 teams entering the quiz. They were able to promote the Burgess Hill Artists exhibition and viewed this as a valuable event as part of the Festival.

7. **Wheels through the Years** – organised in partnership with Weald Classic Vehicle Club (WCVC) was held on warm sunny day and was the first event of its type. WCVC aimed to attract vehicles for each of the Jubilee Years 1952-2022. The event was the largest the Town Council have delivered at Fairfield Recreation Ground and it was helpful to use another site to see how that worked, especially as its location was hidden. The Town Council organised inflatables to attract families with a castle and a slide, ice cream van, Crazy Golf activity, refreshments and arts and crafts in the Fairfield Community Centre led by Burgess Hill

Youth, refreshments from 8th Scouts in their hut (tea and cake) and a BBQ led by 7th Burgess Hill Scouts. The Town Council also liaised with Mid Sussex Radio to provide an OBU for the event to provide music and interview support. In view of the number of vehicles on the site (double the original planned), significant staff time was spent delivering residents' letters to all the surrounding roads to advise of the potential traffic impact and to promote the event. On the day there were some teething issues getting the vehicles onto the site but these were soon rectified to ensure a wonderful event was delivered on the day to visiting public. The 7th Scouts had their busiest community event ever, selling out completely. Additional marshalling was provided by Burgess Hill District Lions and Central Sussex Rotary on the morning of the event to ensure safe entry of the vehicles across the two entry points.

Feedback on the event: Extremely successful in view of numbers of visiting public. This was the only event covered by BBC South East and featured on their evening news bulletin. What seemed to work well was the balance of the family activities with the attraction of the cars to ensure there were things for all to do. The Town Council had booked for 4 portaloos to be delivered on the day and only one materialised. There needs to be at least 6 in view of attending numbers.

The WCVV provided very specific feedback on the operational aspects to include marshalling, publicity and noting that the aspect of the community picnic element was not featured. They are canvassing their members to see if they are able to deliver the event next year and consideration will be given as to whether this will be by them on their own or with support from the Town Council.

Email from 7TH Scouts: "Just a quick thank you for allowing us to assist at today's event. We took an amazing £1116.00 - I'm sure this is a record amount raised at any event!!!!!"

Email from 8TH Scouts: "The wheel fest generated the grand sum of £162.20."

Email from Mid Sussex Radio: "On the whole this was a good event. If there was a negative side it would be the fact that exhibitors were moving their cars off the park before the event had finished. This, of course, was outside the control of the Council and seems to have been agreed by Nick with his exhibitors either prior to or during the event. One exhibitor Steve spoke to said he was leaving to go to the beach!

Sadly, the prize trophies, one of which was for 'Best in Show' and there was another category that I've forgotten, were presented to the winners with only a handful of people watching. But, from what I heard there were only a dozen votes actually cast! Many of the exhibitors had left by that time. The number of visitors to the show, in excess of 2,500, proved that it was a success."

Burgess Hill Youth Chairperson Jackie Cooper confirmed that the club raised approximately £200 as a result of the fundraising activities in the community centre.

8. **Jubilee Jest** was organised by Burgess Hill Bonfire Society with an evening of stand-up comedy held at Cyprus Hall. The Town Council assisted with the funding of the hall hire and the publicity of the event with tickets being sold via Ticket Source (amounting to £630. The Bonfire Society raised £ 424.79 profit on the event and are planning on doing another event at the same venue later this year.

9. **Party in the Park** event was organised by local Mike Stewart and his team who provide a live music event in St John's Park. They liaise with local performers and secure sponsorship towards the event with a focus to raise funds for one charity a year. This was their 9TH YEAR of delivering the event for the community and the chosen charity this year was Time 4 Children. The Town Council role in the event is to assist with publicity featuring it in the festival programme, to deliver residents' letters within the immediate vicinity of the park and to provide Maintenance Team support by delivering and collecting barriers that are used for the event. The Town Council also make a financial contribution to the event costs that are used towards toilet and rubbish collection provision.

Feedback on the event: Mike confirmed the charity benefitted from £330 which he was disappointed with in view of the number of attendees. Kiosk in the Park also raised funds towards the charity and confirmed they would be donating £316.

10. **Senior Citizens' Tea Party** was organised in partnership with Mid Sussex Older People's Council (MSOPC). The Town Council publicised and took bookings for attendees and organised all the food for the event. We initially planned to provide transport liaising with Sussex Community Transport but there was little take up for this so we organised a taxi for the two people (a couple) that needed this to attend. Food was provided to include sandwiches, savoury items as well as scones, cream and jam and other cake items. On arrival the attendees were greeted by a cardboard cut-out of the Queen which was extremely popular and on departure given a commemorative mug to celebrate the Jubilee celebration. The hall was decorated with red, white and blue themed decorations and volunteers from MSOPC assisted with seating of the attendees when they arrived. £300 was donated by Waitrose which was used towards the food costs. Entertainment was provided by Burgess Hill Academy musical department and also a local musical performer called Tanya Rodd to ensure attendees had the opportunity for a singalong on popular music over the last 70 years. There were 100 tickets available and 88 attendees on the day.

Feedback on the event has been extremely positive with thank you cards sent in to the Town Council and received by Mid Sussex Older People's Council and shared with us. MSOPC highlighted the general level of feedback had been high and attendees were grateful to receive the commemorative mugs but pointed out issues on the closeness of tables and presentation of food. However they did highlight the high standard of entertainment provided.

11. **The Lord Chamberlain’s Men performance of ‘As You Like It’** at Burgess Hill Girls School was an entertaining performance and attendees thought it was a high standard. TLMC were paid by the Town Council and then tickets sold to the public from 28 March up until the performance date. The ticket sales are set out below in comparison with previous years events.
