Aim: To deliver a town-wide, community event to celebrate King Charles III's Coronation, in line with the Big Community Lunch theme, as per guidance issued by Buckingham Palace. There was entertainment provided by the Mid Sussex Search for a Star team and free activities.

Number of attendees: estimated footfall of 2,500 across the event duration of 12 noon to 4pm.

Publicity:

The event was advertised in many places as set out below:

- Full social media plan of posts on the Town Council Facebook, Instagram and Twitter in advance. Live posts on the day to encourage attendees and share live activities.
- Posters in the Help Point Window the event title poster, request for donations and programme of event.
- Press release it was featured in the Mid Sussex Times as an article and several times in the Town and Village news section. A post event press release was issued on 9 May 2023.
- All noticeboards in the town 18.
- Poster displayed at Nationwide Community Board and at the station.
- Two banners in prominent locations Triangle roundabout and McDonalds Roundabout.
- Two correx boards -A1 sited at Bandstand (central location in town), and at the park outside the kiosk.
- Post event the event was featured on BBC South East News on the evening of the event.

Event breakdown:

The focus of the event was the musical entertainment, on stage, organised by the Mid Sussex Search for a Star team. This was supported by community stalls selling food:

- Burgess Hill Bonfire Society hog roast and BBQ with all dietary options available;
- 7th Scouts popcorn, candy floss and donuts;
- St John's Church a variety of homemade cakes and preserves.
- Cricket Club bar was open and promoted the club to the visiting public in the pavilion.
- The Park View Kiosk was open selling hot drinks and snacks and had a continual queue as did the Ice Cream van which was provided by Kiosk.

Free activities were provided for the public to enjoy:

- Coronation crafts provided by Burgess Hill Youth
- Sunflower seed planting activity provided by Central Sussex Rotary (overseen by Burgess Hill Youth)
- Bouncy castles provided by Brighton Bouncy Castles

- Polly the Photobooth provided by Handmade and Hire pictures printed with Town Council branding and Big Coronation lunch logo.
- A face painter providing Coronation themed face paints.

We wanted to ensure the event was accessible to all in our community, so we approached Burgess Hill Pantry to request they create hampers for 50 families registered with them, to include items for a picnic. The Town Council secured funding from local business owner Steve Willis, from Steve Willis Training, this was then featured in our pre-event press release thanking him for the donation and was shared with the wider Burgess Hill Business Parks Association Newsletter. Another post was scheduled for 11 May 2023, thanking Steve Willis for his donation.

The Town Council Gazebo was set up on the day providing a central point for people to come to ask any questions about the event and provided an opportunity to promote the future events, and sign up for our events mailing list. This acted as first aid post and lost children point, but fortunately neither of these were required. Three additional toilets were provided for the event in view of footfall and additional rubbish bins were sourced externally.

Feedback:

Funds raised by Community Groups as a result of attending was £1,976 broken down as follow:

Team debrief of the event on Tuesday 9 May captured various points:

- Safe event with no incidents, public were happy with all the activities and entertainment
- Groups attending raised good level of funds
- Closure signs for queues worked well

Even Better If:

- Push the hired bins to the existing bins so that these were even more visible to the public;
- The space was at maximum capacity and the ground suffered due to the weather- consider Fairfield as an alternative location for large scale events as cricket area not an option;
- View of stage impeded by vehicles better behind.
